The Emigration and Immigration of Ernst Augustus Rosqvist

Sweden to the United States

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Immigrants from Sweden have played an important part in the settlement and growth of the United States from the 1638 founding of the colony of New Sweden on the Delaware River¹ to mass emigrations from Sweden in the 19th century, the most significant of which took place in the 15-year period between 1879 and 1893, when nearly a half-million Swedes made the trans-Atlantic voyage to America.² In the early years of the 19th century, Sweden was in a period of peacetime, and that peace, along with the vaccine for smallpox and the introduction of the potato as a food crop, led to an increase in the population of the country. The increase in population decreased the availability of fertile farmland and resulted in a high rate of unemployment for farmers and farmhands, forcing them to abandon agriculture and migrate to the cities or to leave their country altogether and attempt to make a living elsewhere. Massive crop failures in the period of the 1860s to the 1890s were contributors to the mass emigrations to America.³

Many Swedish immigrants were following family members who had come earlier and had extolled the virtues of America to their relatives in the homeland.⁴ The last two decades of the 1800s saw a dramatic rise in the Swedish population in New England as immigrants came searching for jobs in the industrial sector. The Swedish saw in America their chance to raise their families and achieve their dreams.

It was during this period of increased emigration from Sweden that Ernst Augustus Rosqvist, aged 16, began the adventure that would lead him to join his brother Oskar in the United States. Oskar had arrived in America in 1886 and was plying his trade as a tailor in the area around Boston, Massachusetts.⁵ In 1893, Ernst traveled from his hometown of Aseda in the county of Kronoberg in southeastern Sweden to the port of Gothenberg, where, on



31 March, he boarded the S. S. Romeo bound for the city of Hull on the eastern coast of England, with an ultimate destination of Boston.⁶ "The Romeo was mainly trafficking the route between Gothenburg and Hull, a voyage that normally would take 42 hours."⁷ Although no family members accompanied him, he traveled with others from his hometown as they crossed England, perhaps by train, to



the city of Liverpool, where on 5 April 1893 they boarded the S. S. Majestic, bound for New York after a stop in Queenstown, Ireland for the taking on of more passengers.⁸ It is unclear why Ernst traveled through New York on his way to Boston. He may have



been unable to find a ship sailing directly from England to Boston, or he may have been unable to purchase an affordable fare for such a voyage. Whatever his reason, he and his companions sailed aboard the Majestic.

The Atlantic crossing took a week, and the *Majestic* made port in New York City on 12 April 1893. On the ship's arrival manifest, Ernst's age was given as 18 and

his final destination as Chicago. Several of his traveling companions, including those listed before and after him on the passenger manifest, were also listed as heading for Chicago. There is no indication of the identity of the informant, and it could be that it was an assumption that Chicago was Ernst's final destination as well. The difference in Ernst's age on the embarkation list and the arrival list could also be due to informant error, or could be carelessness on the part of the recording clerk.


After his processing through Ellis Island, ¹⁰ Ernst eventually made his way, probably by train, to the Boston area to live and work with his brother. He is listed as Ernest Rosquist with his brother Oscar V. Rosquist, boarding in a house at 22 Dodge Street in the Maplewood neighborhood of Malden, Middlesex County, Massachusetts in 1897. Both were employed tailors. ¹¹ Thus began Ernst's life as an American. He became a naturalized citizen of the United States in 1903, ¹² raised a family, and lived in and around Boston until his death in 1968. ¹³



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

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
